We've been able to support Paediatric ED, the Stroke Ward at Royal Hampshire County Hospital, Breast Oncology, Urology, Neonatal and Urogynaecology by buying them much wanted, state-of-the-art medical equipment. I think the best part of my role is seeing these incredible pieces of equipment arrive at the hospitals and speaking to the clinicians about the impact that the latest technology can have on the delivery of care.

HMF thanks you for your support, whether this has been attending one of our many events, arranging a work event to raise money for the Hampshire Medical Fund, making a one-off donation, becoming a "Friend" of the charity in regular giving, or generously giving up your time to support our work and events.

DEXA Scanner: Enhancing Bone Health Diagnostics

With your help, we have funded a cutting-edge DEXA (Dual-Energy X-ray Absorptiometry) Scanner, now operational in our hospitals. This sophisticated machine provides precise measurements of bone density, crucial for diagnosing conditions like osteoporosis and assessing fracture risks.



Bodyjet EVO for Breast Oncology: A New Era in Treatment

The Bodyjet EVO is a game-changer for breast oncology. This innovative system utilises water-assisted liposuction technology, offering a less invasive method with quicker recovery times.



FEES Equipment for the Stroke Ward: Enhancing Swallowing Assessments

We have introduced new FEES (Fiberoptic Endoscopic Evaluation of Swallowing) equipment to the Hampshire Hospitals stroke ward. This technology provides a detailed assessment of swallowing difficulties, crucial for patients with dysphagia.



BK Ultrasound Machine for Urology: Improving Diagnostic Imaging

Your donations have also allowed us to support the urology department with a new BK Ultrasound machine. This state-of-the-art system offers high-resolution imaging and advanced features for urological assessments.

The improved diagnostic capabilities this offers will enhance patient care and monitoring, reflecting our commitment to top-quality healthcare. This piece of equipment was kindly funded by Prostate Cancer Support Organisation.

the paediatric resus room and emergency department waiting room at Royal Hampshire County Hospital.

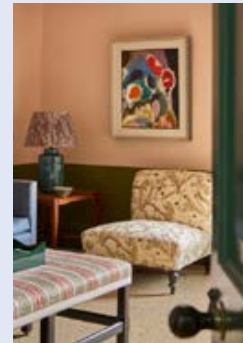

Anisys GO BioFeedback Unit for Fundamentals of Care

The Anisys GO is a revolutionary system poised to transform continence care. Designed to provide precise, actionable insights, the Anisys GO is a portable unit that streamlines the assessment and management of chronic constipation and involuntary bowel leaks. By significantly reducing the need for multiple assessments, this innovative device empowers clinicians to formulate bespoke care plans tailored to each patient's unique needs, whilst minimising discomfort and inconvenience.

Thera-Trainer Virtual Bike Ride for Rehabilitation Ward

The Thera Trainer is a small and portable motor-assisted stationary cycling trainer for legs and upper body. In the aftermath of prolonged hospital stays, patients often grapple with diminished motivation and mood. The Thera-Trainer Virtual Bike Ride offers not just physical exercise, but a lifeline of stimulation and engagement, uplifting spirits and expediting recovery timelines.

Morcellator for Urology

The tissue Morcellator is a specialised medical device crucial for addressing benign prostate enlargement (BPH) in patients, a condition that affects around 2.5 million men in the UK. Its primary role is to break down sizable masses of prostate tissue for removal and will be used to treat patients in the Urology Department at Basingstoke Hospital. Currently, HHFT faces limitations in treating patients with larger prostates due to longer operating time, which heightens surgical risks such as bleeding. Investing in the Morcellator will allow for safer procedures, whilst also enhancing the capacity to manage a greater volume of patient referrals with enlarged prostates.

UVA Phototherapy Unit

The Basingstoke & North Hampshire Hospital require funding for the NLINET/UVA Phototherapy Unit, a piece of equipment designed to treat conditions such as eczema and psoriasis. This advanced device offers precise and personalised treatment plans, providing effective relief with minimal side effects, meeting needs in accordance with National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) guidance. The current UVA phototherapy machine requires replacement to ensure continued high-quality care to those in need.

Ventilated Specimen Table for Cellular Pathology

The Ventilated Specimen Dissection Table is a critical asset for cellular pathology labs, facilitating the processing of biopsies and tissues critical for diagnosing cancer and other diseases. This specialised table safeguards users from harmful exposure and reduces turnaround time for diagnosis, enabling quicker and more effective treatments. With the addition of this table, the lab at Basingstoke & North Hampshire Hospital can also expand training opportunities, addressing the imminent workforce shortage and ensuring a sustainable future in pathology.

The Aquablation unit offers non-thermal robotically executed therapy in a timely manner, offering significant symptom relief, with minimal risk and predictable outcomes.

An Interview with Tim Nedas

Head of Urology, Hampshire Hospitals

Can you share your thoughts on the overall impact of the Hampshire Medical Fund's contributions to the urology department within Hampshire Hospitals?

All of our hospitals are extremely fortunate to be recipients of support from the Hampshire Medical Fund. The generosity and enthusiasm of our supporters and sponsors has never failed to amaze me. Delving into the world of urology, which is the speciality I work in, reveals that nearly every aspect of what we do has been helped by HMF.



In January 2020, the Hampshire Medical Fund provided the urology department with a revolutionary ultrasound machine to facilitate prostate cancer diagnostics. Since then we have received over 6,000 referrals to assess whether or not a man might have prostate cancer. The biopsy machine is a key component of our diagnostic pathway and will have been used in the region of 2000 times to answer that question. The machine has also allowed us to improve our patient timelines and experience. It seems extraordinary that having worked out how important to our patients the koelis machine is I am still able to talk about other aspects of the urology service that have been aided by the Hampshire Medical Fund.

Also in the field of prostate cancer HMF has supported the purchase of a High Intensity Focus Ultrasound machine for the treatment of prostate cancer. This treatment which is suitable for a small subset of patients with prostate cancer is delivered in relatively few locations in the UK and Hampshire Hospitals has built up an international reputation aided by the help of the Hampshire Medical Fund.

An area of urology that is particularly close to my heart (metaphorically rather anatomically!) is the treatment of kidney stones and we were very fortunate to be the recipients of a mini-PCNL (percutaneous nephrolithotomy) kit as a result of an HMF fundraising event, the Two Smoking Barrels Clay Pigeon Shoot. For very large kidney stones the operation has evolved over the last forty years from a large (20cm) cut under the ribs to a telescopic approach through the skin directly to the kidney. The standard version of this telescope is around 10mm but the mini PCNL kit is 4mm in size. It may not seem like a huge change but the difference is a reduced hospital stay, (which can be less than 24 hours), freeing up beds for other patients and significantly reduced pain for the patient.

I am delighted to be able to continue this journey by describing the Thullium LASER that was provided by the Hampshire Medical Fund two years ago. To enable stones to be broken by tiny telescopes we need an energy source and our previous LASER was a fairly standard model that succumbed to old age. As you may have noticed by now urologists are fairly obsessed with technology and so it might not surprise your readers to learn that LASER technology had moved on somewhat during the ten years or so we have had our first machine. The Hampshire Medical Fund accepted our proposal to acquire the latest technology which breaks stones quickly and more effectively than previous machines. We were then even more fortunate to garner the support of an evening at The Grange to raise money for the machine. We use this LASER in patients with bladder stones, small kidney stones and large stones (for PCNL) so it is used for about 100 operations a year. For those supporters who haven't had a kidney stone, they are exquisitely painful and prompt effective treatment means that patients recover and return to work quicker. Hampshire Hospitals is a national leader for achieving this as a day case for around 80% of our patients. Any readers who have not been bored by this urology tutorial, will discover later on how the LASER has other uses too.

An Interview with

Tim Nedas continued...

Could you explain the importance of the new Morcellator also funded by HMF and how it will improve surgical outcomes?

The urology tutorial continues! The only technique we do not offer for enlarged prostates at Hampshire Hospitals is enucleation. This technique involves cutting the prostate in its anatomical planes with a laser and then pushing the “enucleated” tissue into the bladder. It is very good for large prostates. We have the laser for this from the Hampshire Medical Fund but we need a machine to chop the enucleated tissue into small pieces in the bladder so it can be removed without the need for an incision. Surgical outcomes in large prostates from the Morcellator are excellent, reducing operating times and hospital stays.

In what ways will the new ultrasound machine enhance diagnostic capabilities within the urology department?

Having explained a little about the techniques and decision making for a man with prostate symptoms, keen readers might have noted that the urologist and doctor need to know the size of the prostate. This is important when thinking about benign and cancerous conditions. The new ultrasound machine means we can measure a prostate gland in clinic aiding our decision making discussions and timelines for more of our patients.

With our new prostate tools a patient living in Hampshire contemplating seeking our help for their prostate can be confident that we can provide them with a complete assessment and discussion of all appropriate options.

From your perspective, what are the most significant advancements in urology equipment over the past few years?

I think the precision of our tools is the key development. Urologists can get into the kidney with 4mm devices and look at the prostate gland with an ultrasound or MRI scan to an astonishing level of clarity. We can dissect the prostate gland in situ under clear vision. In other areas of urology, minimisation and increased precision have also been key developments, particularly in the field of robotic surgery.

How do you foresee the new pieces of equipment changing patient care and treatment protocols at Hampshire hospitals?

Surgeons have been challenged for the last five years or so by the NHS slogan “Get it Right First Time”, a mantra that means achieving great outcomes for patients whilst being efficient with costs and hospital stays. Perhaps the missing link is the funding that provides the technology to do this. The new pieces of kit equipment will allow us to improve outcomes, timelines and efficiency for our patients and the aspiration would be that this then provides the model for other departments to follow. It would be remiss of me not to mention that the organisational medical landscape is now a little more outward facing than it used to be. We work collaboratively with our other local departments. Put simply we are going to have equipment they don’t have (and they have some we don’t) and having relationships that mean patients can access the right procedure for them relatively locally and quickly is an important part of our work. The work of the Hampshire Medical Fund will really be reaching across all of Hampshire.

What message would you like to convey to the supporters of the Hampshire Medical Fund about the importance of their contributions?

I started this interview by talking about the enthusiasm and generosity of the Hampshire Medical Fund supporters and sponsors. Taking part in this interview has allowed me to put the impact of the donations to the urology department in one place and it is absolutely extraordinary. I can also think of dozens of other pieces of kit provided to other departments (it is not just the urology department and patients that have benefitted). Off the top of my head that includes more than 20 incubators, thorascopy equipment, groundbreaking sepsis equipment and vital training tools. There are many, many more. The message I have for our supporters is simple; Thank you, Thank you, Thank you. Your efforts are hugely appreciated and have a fundamental impact on the functioning of your local hospitals. They are a better place as a result of your donations and please keep supporting us if you can.

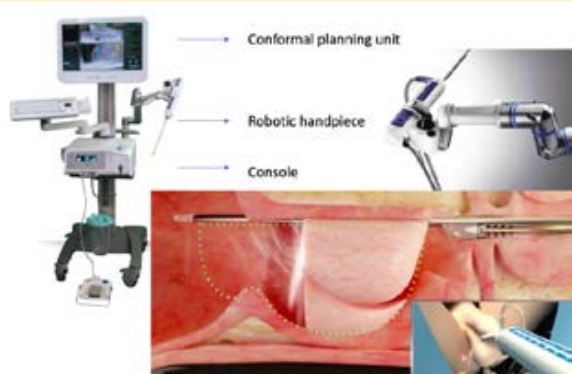

First Robotic Equipment arrives at HHFT

We are thrilled to announce that we are so close to funding the first piece of robotic equipment for Hampshire Hospitals!

Lord and Lady Andrew & Madeleine Lloyd Webber, charity patrons of the Hampshire Medical Fund, welcomed guests into their home for an informal summer drinks party to raise awareness of this incredibly innovative piece of equipment being purchased by the Hampshire Medical Fund, in support of urology in our local hospitals.



Guests were treated to delicious canapés, drinks and music whilst learning about the Aquablation robotic system which will provide cutting-edge treatment for men with benign prostate enlargement (BPE). (Please read more on pages 11 & 14). Recently recommended by the National Institute for Health and Care Excellence, the robotics equipment was hailed for its groundbreaking approach. At Hampshire Hospitals, the adoption of the Aquablation robotic therapy promises to greatly enhance the service currently on offer and is complimentary to the established prostate treatments, providing greater choice and improved outcomes for patients. When asked about the Aquablation equipment for HHFT, Consultant Richard Hindley said “this technology is very exciting and promises to greatly enhance our ability to provide a durable solution for men with this common condition; this is achieved with a very low likelihood of side-effects. This is the first robotic system at Hampshire Hospitals, and it will also likely provide opportunities for research, as well as attracting high-calibre staff to join the urology team.”

The Aquablation robotic system costs a staggering £225,000, which with incredible support from the guests at the summer drinks party, we are amazingly close to achieving. If you are able to help complete the fundraising, please scan the QR code. We are very grateful for any support you can give.
